1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Student's feedback is filled by both UG and PG Students in the college at the end of every semester the College now follows a standardized system for collecting feedback from students through suitably designed feedback forms. Feedback is received on varied aspects of the college including location, infrastructure, office, canteen, laboratory, library, administration and academics. The points are calculated according to the grades given by the students in various criteria. The strength and weaknesses mentioned by the students are summarized. Feedback is also collected from the parents during Parent Teacher Meetings (PTMs) that are organised by each and every department of the college. Suggestions and comments given by the parents are also taken into account for future development. The performance of all teaching staff is appraised by the end of each semester. A selfappraisal is prepared by each teacher. The Principal intervenes and addresses possible areas of improvement. principal also evaluates these with each teacher, motivating her/him to look at specific areas where growth is needed. The Heads assess the staff performance based on their class room teaching, their interpersonal relationship in the department, the punctuality, regularity and contribution to the department in general and to the institution in particular. The principal assess the staff on their overall performance both in academic and nonacademic matters. An annual feedback - 'Looking Back To Look Forward' is done with the teachers. The different areas where improvements are required are discussed in respective committees/departments. The proposals given by the different committees and departments are discussed in Academic meeting of the college for necessary action. Strengths of the college are also taken into consideration for further up gradation. They gave their feedback in the prescribed form, which will be analyzed by board members and suggestions implemented for the welfare of the students. Feedback from Parents are collected, department wise when Parents

Teachers Meeting is held during every semester. Alumni meet will be organized on every August 15, where they share their industry, working experiences with us and they give suggestions and feedback for the growth of students.

Response: College has adequate physical facilities and infrastructure for the existing academic programmes and administrative functions, cocurricular and extracurricular activities. Departments with well furnished class rooms, language laboratory, Library with internet facilities, Computer lab, Photo copying centre, well furnished seminar halls and auditorium, and smart class room are available for students. The common facilities like auditoriums and seminar halls are utilized by booking in advance. These are used for conducting guest lectures, training, conferences, workshops and activities for faculty and students. The College auditorium is used for conducting all academic and cultural functions of the college. Well equipped seminar halls are available for organizing seminar and conducting departmental association activities. Smart Class room and auditorium are airconditioned. All departments have well equipped staff rooms for the faculty members with the atmosphere conducive for regular interaction with the students who come for counseling, guidance and clarifications. Internet facility is available in the staff rooms with LAN connections, in addition to the WiFi enabled for all the blocks. The students can access the internet in the computation centre as well as the WiFi available in all the blocks. Apart from central library, PG and Research Department of Computer Science has utility based library. Students and faculty members can access electronic journals and ebooks from any machine. Students and faculty members can access NPTEL. All the laboratories possess licensed softwares, equipments and systems in a functioning condition. Each laboratory maintains a stock register detailing the history of the equipments available. Each laboratory functions as per the schedule specified in the time table of the programme. The laboratory technicians support in the regular maintenance of the computers and the smooth conduct of the practical classes for improving the quality of learning experience. Access to the INFLIBNET, MALIBNET (Madras LIBraryNETwork) are available. Teaching materials prepared by the faculty members are shared with the students through email groups. Resources are shared across departments whenever needed. Most of the departments have computer laboratories which are utilized for online examinations, aptitude tests, project development and competitions by students of all departments. Computer science and visual communication departments has dedicated laboratories and classrooms. Considering the contact hours of each course, classroom and laboratory utilization time table is planned by the departments and effectively completed with the help of the lab technicians. All these facilities are as per the norms of the University of Madras, our affiliating body. Under Tamil Nadu Student welfare scheme, several students received Laptop to facilitate effective learning, easy access to internet, for preparing their assignments and become conversant with the use of technology. Students are motivated to collect resources related to their subject from the esources to prepare their assignments, seminars and projects. To make the curriculum more industry elevant, the students are taken on field trips, industrial visits, educational

tours, etc. Separate hygienic rest rooms are available for both girls and boys students.
